

# Restoration Plans Move Forward

Plans are underway to begin restoration of former Shelburne Falls & Colrain Street Railway combine number ten. Even as papers were being drawn up in March and signed — papers which would formally transfer ownership of the trolley from Marshall Johnson to the museum — Stan Stillwell of Holyoke was agreeing to head up the restoration work. Stan, a woodworker by profession, has worked for over five years at the California State Railway Museum in Sacramento and at the Nevada State Railway Museum in Carson City restoring wooden passenger cars, a caboose, and a locomotive cab.

Helping Stan will be Brian Carr, formerly of the B&M Railroad, Mike Fontanella, formerly of the Burlington Northern Railroad, and others who have expressed an interest in joining the effort. Kinsley Goodrich of Dalton has agreed to be a consultant. Kinsley, just retired as principal owner of C.M. Goodrich & Son, a Pittsfield architectural woodworking firm, has been active with real and model trolleys for over forty years. He combines a genuine historical knowledge of New England trolleys with a practical understanding of their construction.

Number ten will be restored at the Johnson farm. Immediate plans call for moving the car closer to the barn and constructing a temporary lean-to shelter with the barn forming one side. Before it is moved, the car's structural members will be examined carefully by Stillwell and Goodrich.

### Treks — Past and Future

The museum's value to the community is already proving more tangible than many might have expected. Last October SFTM operated "trolley" bus tours on three Fall foliage weekends through Shelburne and Buckland. Billed as Trolleysaurus Treks, the free rides proved popular with tourists and residents alike. More than 800 people rode the sometimes packed bus to stops at sponsoring stores along the route. The feature stop, for our money, was the Johnson farm where number ten resides (as do the Johnsons).

In December the tours — this time Santatrolley Treks — ran the weekend before Christmas. Approximately 200 people (mostly children) rode the "trolley" and got a chance to meet Santa. Next August the Trolleysaurus is expected to reappear in the form of a shuttle between Shelburne Center and Shelburne Falls for the Grange Fair. SFTM is also planning to operate a parking lot pool van for the event.



February 8 and 9 saw the debut of SFTM in the *Big Railroad Hobby Show* at the Big E in West Springfield. It took more than "seasonal" weather and a prolonged recession to keep the fans away from this increasingly popular event sponsored each year by the Amherst Railway Society. More than 17,000 people attended — a new record for the show which two years ago had to be expanded from one day to two because of overcrowding.

Brian Carr, Mike Fontanella and his nephew Arnold Terrill, Bob Coliskey, Ryan Manewich, Winfield Peck, Tony Jewell, and Al Barten took turns passing out literature and answering questions. Besides providing valuable exposure for the museum to area residents, five visitors to the show "came our way" as new members. We also sold several hundred dollars' worth of books, cards, and buttons. Some trading with other



dealers at the show garnered a number of Shelburne Falls and local trolley related items for the museum's future gift shop.

The Amherst Railway Society, incidentally, is a benefactor to organizations such as ours, drawing for this purpose on proceeds it receives from the train show. 


# Museum/Gift Shop to Open
