A BALANCING ACT

I worked during my college summers as a fireman on the steam locomotives at the Conway (NH) Scenic Railroad. Proper locomotive firing is a balancing act in two ways. Physically you are scooping and throwing five tons of coal a day on a bouncing deckplate. And thermodynamically you need to keep plenty of boiling water in the boiler, but the incoming water is cold. Too much feed water and you lose steam. Not enough water and the crownsheet overheats and the boiler explodes! You try to put in water on the downgrades, when you don't need steam. You try to put in coal on the uphills, to get a better draft from the working engine's exhaust. The perfect balance comes when you reach the top of a grade with a hot fire and low (but not too low) water, so you can put in more water on the downgrade, to keep the pressure from getting so high that the safety valve 'pops'.

The Shelburne Falls Trolley Museum's Board of Directors has been trying a similar balancing act. We need to put money into the buildings to protect our investment, to meet certain building codes, and to make the rentable spaces more attractive. If we improve the space enough, we'll get more money back from rental income, to help us pay off our mortgage, which is \$1000 each month. We put in most of the money we had saved in the last few years, along with some additional money we raised and some money we borrowed from the bank. We wanted to keep some of our savings as a buffer against unforeseen expenses, planning to build the reserves back up over the next few years as rental income came in.

We've mostly managed to do that, but we ran into some unexpected costs complying with building codes, so our savings are a bit lower than we would like to have them. Rental income is only one of many pieces that fund our operation. We also get revenue from ticket sales, visitor donations and TrolleyStop store sales. One of our most important revenue streams is memberships and large donations. If you haven't renewed, please do so now, we can really use your help. And if you feel that our efforts to preserve our buildings and freight yard, keep No. 10 going and improve our Visitors Center displays are worthy of extra support, we are always glad for additional contributions. We're nearly at the top of the hill, but we need to throw a little more coal in the firebox. Can you help?

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!!!

The Shelburne Falls Trolley Museum will soon be opening for its eighth year of trolley operations, and this will be our sixteenth year of preserving local railroad and trolley history, starring the meticulously restored No. 10. In the last few years we have made major improvements to the property with volunteer help. Buildings, track, and rolling stock have all benefitted. Those are the big projects, which help us to have a more permanent presence.

There are plenty of smaller projects that are underway or have been completed, and of course we've been running the trolley, giving pump car rides and answering lots of questions about railroads and trolleys.

All of this work requires lots of volunteer time. We rely heavily on a few volunteers, with many more helping out several days a month during the operating season. We are always looking for more helpers; we need ticket sellers, painters, carpenters, track workers, lawn mowers and cleaners. And of course, we are always glad to have more trolley car crew members, we'll provide the training. If you can help with any of these things, please email me at sam@sftm.org or call 413-624-0192.

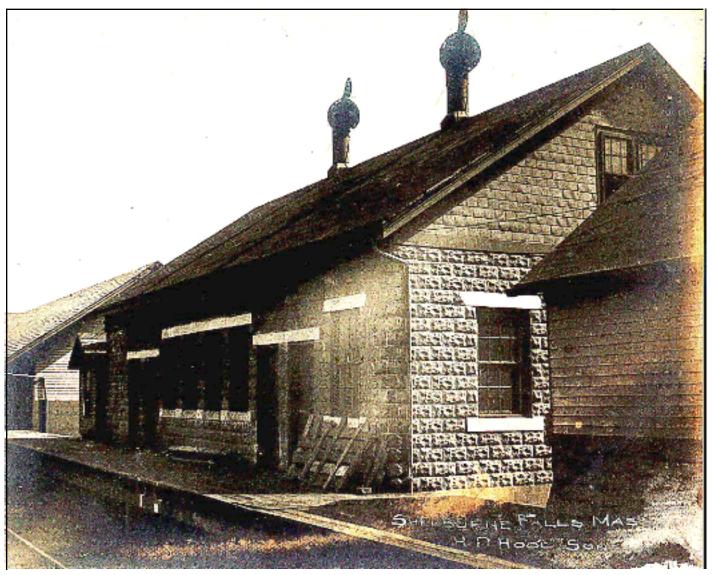
In the **body** of your message, please enter **your name.**

HOW MANY COWS DOES IT TAKE TO.....

If you have ever visited the Museum, you've probably wondered what that crumbling concrete foundation with the two rusty tanks was all about. Now it can be told - sort of.

Shelburne Falls was, a hundred years ago, the hub of a very large milk-producing area and it just happened to be located on a major rail line with a direct route to Boston, that notorious town of flagrant milk-consumers. Shipping milk by rail was a serious business in those days, and getting milk to the shipping point was important revenue for the Shelburne Falls & Colrain Street Railway. Car Number 10's freight section was packed with milk cans on many trips. The cans were loaded onto trains here and at numerous other points along the line to Boston.

In time it was decided that the yard needed a building to keep the milk cool between trains. The picture above shows the very substantial creamery that was built by H. P. Hood to do the job. At one time the milk trade was so viable that a special milk train would originate in the Hoosac Falls NY area and run nonstop to Boston - except for Shelburne Falls, where it would stop and pick up whole carloads of bulk milk.

The existing freight house is visible at the far left. A pair of small and long-gone structures bracket the milk house.

Like so many other transitions in our yard, the milk business left the rails for the roads and the creamery building was demolished, leaving only the concrete foundation with its terra-cotta tile floor to bear crumbling witness to another era.

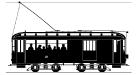
